# How to be a good Growth Group member at MBM

#### Be there

Seek to commit yourself to your small group family weekly. Our groups aren't just events we go to, but people we do life with. The blessings we give and get from one another are of eternal value!

Be on about God and what He's doing in each other's lives. Share His word with each other, pray for each other, encourage mission and godly living, rebuke, correct and train one another in righteousness.

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# Learning Life

## Fitting Proverbs into the larger story of the Bible

The Book of Proverbs is one of several Old Testament books that teach godly wisdom. The Bible's word for wisdom means "skill" or "craftsmanship." A person was considered wise if they could do something particularly well.

The Book of Proverbs is not merely a book about morals. It is part of God's revelation of his saving work and grace.

The Bible begins with God's Book of Instructions (Genesis – Deuteronomy). Then comes the record of Israel's failure to follow those instructions and God's persevering grace (Joshua – Esther). The wisdom books (Job – Song of Solomon) then set out the skills we need to figure out how God's good design for life works. They are followed by the books of the prophets (Isaiah – Malachi) who were like God's life coaches. God sent them to help his people to trust him and obey him as they waited for the promised saviour.

Then came Jesus who fulfilled God's promises to save his people. Jesus called people to commit to him as Lord and saviour. His people are called disciples. When we commit to Christ we sign on to learn and practise godly living. A disciple is an apprentice, a trainee, a learner. The skill we sign on to learn is living life God's way.

# Wisdom is the skill of living in God's world, God's way, as God's image, for God's glory.

God designed this world, and human beings, to display his wisdom, character, and glory.

God created the first man and woman

with all the skills they needed. They had a perfect capacity to learn and to live life as God designed it to work.

When Eve looked at the forbidden fruit, she thought she would gain more wisdom. Sadly, by eating it, she and Adam became fools. They did not fear God. Mankind became dysfunctional the moment they disobeyed God.

When we ignore God we try to redesign reality to suit ourselves, and in doing so we hurt ourselves and others. Through our rebellion against God, human beings are the most destructive species on earth.

The Bible's Wisdom books enable us to take hold of the promise of the redemption of our thinking and our life skills, as we relate with God and others in His world.

The Book of Proverbs is a collection of wisdom from many sources. Even without reference to God, people can benefit from it. Whether you are a Christian or not, wisdom will tell you marriages work better without adultery, and decision making is safer when sober. Yet the value of life done well under God is not fully experienced apart from relationship with God.

After the fall, God graciously promised to take away our sin. He began fulfilling that promise when the Son of God became a man in the womb of a woman. That man, Jesus, defeated Satan, sin, and death by dying in our place. He gives us back the life we threw away. He restores our ability to live life the way he designed it, taking away our foolishness and renewing our wisdom.

Throughout the Scriptures God teaches

us how life works. Jesus said, "I am the way and the truth and the life." The New Testament identifies Jesus as the personification of Wisdom. He is the perfect image and expression of God. Through his death, resurrection and the gift of His empowering Holy Spirit, he secures a new heart and nature for his people. We are each given the skills and power to perform a wide range of ministries for others.

The Gospel of Jesus transforms us to be refreshingly counter cultural. In a world that is dying striving for the sake of self, the security of wealth, and an identity defined by sexuality, God has much more in store for us. He's displaying the treasures of his wisdom through us.

The Book of Proverbs speaks to our character and relationships, as well as to matters of work, and money. It begins as a father-son chat. As we read this book we need to picture ourselves sitting on the Father's knee, receiving his wisdom. He presents us with a choice between the destructive seductions of this world and an eternal life with dignity and significance.

The cost of foolishness is disastrous. God has graciously made a way for fools to become wise. It requires faith and commitment, and is only effective because it is God at work in us, transforming our lives for his glory. We strive with the help of the Holy Spirit to be more like Jesus reflecting the character of God. We begin, like Solomon did, asking God for wisdom:

If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you. James 1:5

Before you begin these studies, you may want to read and digest Proverbs chapter 8.

# Important words in Proverbs

Proverbs uses a range of words to help us understand the scope of wisdom and foolishness. It can sometimes be hard for our various English bible versions to grasp or appreciate the full meaning of these words.

#### Words that describe different aspects of our brokenness.

SIN

Sin is being out of step (Proverbs 19:2) or missing the target (Judges 20:16). Ultimately being out of step with God.

THE SIMPLE

The Simple are the "the naïve" (Proverbs 1:4). Naïvety isn't a sin. It is a starting point. The Hebrew word means to be open. One can be open minded, and keen to learn, or one can be gullible. The naïve person must choose. It is a matter of life

THE FOOL

- 1. The fool is one who is committed to moral perversion, and a refusal to be taught. This word means to be thick or impenetrable.
- 2. The fool matches what we sometimes call stupidity. This is about being overconfident, reckless, opinionated, or hot-

THE MOCKER

Mockers or scoffers, ridicule learning. They can't appreciate God's discipline. God mocks these mockers (Proverbs 3:34).

**LACKING JUDGEMENT** 

Lacking Judgement is literally to "lack heart." This means that a person lacks sense, and resists learning wisdom from others.

#### Words that describe the process of learning to live life well.

#### **KNOWLEDGE**

is information that is gained through words (information) and experience.

#### **WISDOM**

1. Wisdom is the product of knowledge and practice. It is the skill of the master craftsman (See Exodus 31:1–5 as an example). It is the ability to be effective and productive. It begins with the fear and knowledge of God. Wisdom is portrayed and personified in various ways through proverbs.

2. Wisdom produces the ability to manage one's affairs.

#### **UNDERSTANDING**

Understanding is about being able to discriminate right from wrong, good from bad. It is about perspective, competence, intelligence.

#### **PRUDENCE**

Prudence enables one to plan and accomplish outcomes, for good or ill. It can also be translated cunning or craftiness.

#### DISCRETION

Discretion is the ability to think clearly, making considered decisions.



#### Main Idea

Christians live with a healthy fear of who our powerful God is. Yet we need not fear Him who gave us his precious Son to free us from the fear of His judgement.

### Main Idea

God is true. Jesus has freed us from shame and deception to live lives of truth, honesty, and integrity. He gives us space to confess who we truly are.

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## How does the saving work of Jesus free us from the need to be dishonest?

my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know

Proverbs describe how God designed life to work and they point out the things that make life dysfunctional. They invite us to observe and learn. They give us a good sense of what will probably happen if we continue along a certain path of decisions. They are mostly, generally true. Yet, they are not the laws that govern every scenario and situation in life.

Under God, in a world marred by sin, inhabited by sinners, things don't always go as God tells us they should.

God has allowed humans a genuine freedom to live the kind of lives we want. This freedom means at times good things happen to bad people, and good people suffer. This will continue until the day Jesus returns and puts all things right, ultimately judging sin and rescuing his people. Until then, Proverbs present us with trustworthy wisdom as we live life relating with a trustworthy God in the midst of a broken world.



Read the following Proverbs and share how you have experienced these truths in life. You might want to break into pairs for this section and ask each group to choose one or two of these.

# Friendship

#### Main Idea

Friendship is a gift, flowing from a relational God. Sin has caused relational friction, but through Jesus we have been freed to commit ourselves to others.

## 7 Read and discuss: How does this work?

1 Corinthians 5:9–13 I wrote to you in my letter not to associate with sexually

immoral people—not at all meaning the people of this world who are immoral, or the greedy and swindlers, or idolaters. In that case you would have to leave this world. But now I am writing to you that you must not associate with anyone who claims to be a brother or sister but is sexually immoral or greedy, an idolater or slanderer, a drunkard or swindler. Do not

even eat with such people.

## Sex + Marriage

#### Main Idea

God designed marriage and sexuality as a blessing. Sin damaged these gifts. In Christ they can be restored and maintained to his and our great delight.

## **Getting Started**

The elephant in the room...

This is Solomon passing on his wisdom concerning sex and marriage to his son. Solomon disobeyed God, married a thousand women, including foreign women who led him into worshipping their gods. The only son of Solomon we read about was Rehoboam.

He ignored wisdom and provoked the revolt of the northern ten tribes. So why are Solomon's words given to us as God's words on this subject? Solomon is a contradiction at every level. On the one hand he was famous for his wisdom and given great grace by God (1 Kings 3:10–15; 4:29–34; 10:1–25). On the other hand he made some terrible choices.

This tension is not accidental. The word of God comes to us through damaged human beings, but it is still God's personal words to us. The messenger may be damaged, but the Word of God is not.

God hates pride! Humility is essential to living out a relationship with God and it blesses our relationships with others. Proverbs helps us explore and appreciate these blessings.



Ecclesiastes 2:10-11 I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused my heart

no pleasure. My heart took delight in all my labor, and this was the reward for all my toil. Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done and what I had toiled to achieve, everything was meaningless, a chasing after the wind; nothing was

gained under the sun.

Ecclesiastes 2:20--23 So my heart began to despair over all my toilsome labor under

> the sun. For a person may labor with wisdom, knowledge and skill, and then they must leave all they own to another who has not toiled for it. This too is meaningless and a great misfortune. What do people get for all the toil and anxious striving with which they labor under the sun? All their days their work is grief and pain; even at night their minds do not

rest. This too is meaningless.

Proverbs has a lot to say about laziness. Share these proverbs around the group. Consider the motivations and consequences of laziness. Why might God want us to reflect so deeply on the negative effects of it?

Proverbs 26:16 A sluggard is wiser in his own eyes than seven people who answer

discreetly.

Lazy hands make for poverty, but diligent hands bring wealth. He Proverbs 10:4-5 who gathers crops in summer is a prudent son, but he who sleeps during harvest is a disgraceful son. Proverbs 24:30-34 I went past the field of a sluggard, past the vineyard of someone who has no sense; thorns had come up everywhere, the ground was covered with weeds, and the stone wall was in ruins. I applied my heart to what I observed and learned a lesson from what I saw: A little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to rest—and poverty will come on you like a thief and scarcity like an armed man. How does the noble wife example from Proverbs 31 encourage 3 and challenge each of us in our various life scenarios (wife/mother, husband/father, child, student, part-time/full-time worker, retired. volunteer, etc)? Proverbs 31:13-22 She selects wool and flax and works with eager hands. She is like the merchant ships, bringing her food from afar. She gets up while it is still night; she provides food for her family and portions for her female servants. She considers a field and buys it; out of her earnings she plants a vineyard. She sets about her work vigorously; her arms are strong for her tasks. She sees that her trading is profitable, and her lamp does not go out at night. In her hand she holds the distaff and grasps the spindle with her fingers. She opens her arms to the poor and extends her hands to the needy. When it snows, she has no fear for her household; for all of them are clothed in scarlet. She makes coverings for her bed; she is clothed in fine linen and purple. She watches over the affairs of her household and does not eat the Proverbs 31:27 bread of idleness.



#### Main Idea

Our anger can either reflect God's or replace it. If we replace it, we put ourselves in the place of God and great damage follows.

## **Getting Started**

When was the last time you felt angry? What or who was it directed at?

#### Why am I so angry?

Anger is not a primary emotion, but secondary. That means, when we feel angry, there's usually something else going on underneath the surface. We might have felt hurt, jealous, insecure, or unsafe. Our pride may have been prodded. Feeling anger gives us an opportunity to explore what's going on in our hearts. It is not always sinful. But when left unchecked, it can cover up all kinds of unhelpful, impure or sinful attitudes lurking below. Because God's heart is pure, when he responds in anger towards evil, His anger is always right and justified. Our prayer is that by His Spirit, our hearts might learn to reflect His.

Anger is a powerful response. Share your stories and observations with respect to any of the following proverbs (you could do this in pairs):

#### Read the following case study.

A man rang his pastor with the message, "She has called the police. Can you come?" He quickly called another member of the ministry team and hurried to the address. The wife had just come home from hospital after major surgery. Her husband had hit her and knocked her onto her bed where she remained. They ushered the husband into the living room and kept him there. The doctor arrived first. Then the police. His rage quickly turned to pleading. His main worry was that the neighbours would see him being arrested. They loaded him into the wagon. As they left the police sergeant passed on this advice. He said, in over 90% of cases the sight of a police uniform will be enough to stop any further assaults. In the other cases, nothing but incarceration will control their rage and violence.
